### ARTS309 - Visual Research

The course is experimental and open-ended, and includes analytical drawing to discover new ways of seeing, including the examination of every day objects in changing situations. Perception and the principles of looking in a larger context will be explored through application and experimentation using a wide range of drawing materials.

# **ARTS317 - Three Dimensional**

This course extends the first year's sculpture investigations with an emphasis placed on acquiring a working knowledge of a number of new materials and processes. The acquired information will be applied in a number of three- dimensional projects. A higher level of conceptualization is expected.

### ARTS320 - Canadian Art

A survey of Canadian Art History from early colonial to the present day, including indigenous art, current painting, sculpture and avantgarde work.

# ARTS321 - Printmaking

The student will be introduced to the methods of printmaking through a number of set drawing and compositional problems. Relief Print, Lithographic, Intaglio and computer techniques will be explored throughout the semester and a high degree of technical competence will be demanded of the student using these techniques.

# ARTS401 - Fine Art

This course builds on the insights and information obtained in the third semester, placing more emphasis on concepts and processes. The course takes the form of a series of projects. Emphasis is placed on development of content and direction. Each project deals with a specific content using a variety of processes e.g. drawing, performance, installation, photography. Project content subjects are quite varied e.g. culture events, family, dreams, childhood memories.

# ARTS409 - Visual Research

The course continues to discover new ways of seeing through drawing. Perception and the principles of looking in a larger context will be explored through application and experimentation using a wide range of materials. Major works in painting will be accomplished.

### ARTS417 - Three Dimensional

This course extends the visual investigations begun in ARTS317 with an emphasis placed on acquiring a working knowledge of a number of different materials and processes. Through several projects, students will further develop conceptual skills and expand the notions of sculpture.

### ARTS420 - Cubism to Abstract Expressionism

Analysis of Western Art in the first half of the twentieth century. Emphasis will be placed on the major movements of this period.

# ARTS421 - Printmaking

A further introduction to contemporary and traditional processes of printmaking techniques. The core discipline of printmaking encompasses: Lithography, Intaglio, Serigraphy, Woodcut and Linocut. Furthermore, it is required that the student utilise

contempo. , methods such as the use of "original" computer generated imagery in conjunction with printmaking methods. The historical context of printmaking will be learned through the use of printmaking practices, and knowledge of print artists.

# ARTS513 - Art Now

An intensive survey of the characteristic elements of contemporary art in the post-second world war western world. Emphasis will be placed on individuals representing different ways of thinking in such movements as Expressionism, Pop, Minimal, Conceptual, Environmental and Post-Modernism.

# ARTS515 - Fine Art

Building upon the satisfactory completion of work covered in the prerequisite courses, students enter into a program of semi-independent research in a variety of media, as defined and developed by the staff and students using a semi-tutorial method.

### **ARTS610 - Information for Artists**

A course that is designed to assist graduating students meet the objectives as practising artists. The series of lectures are designed to provide information relevant to the pursuits of becoming a professional artist.

# ARTS615 - Fine Art

Students continue into a program of semi-independent research in a variety of media, as defined and developed by the faculty and students using a semi-tutorial method. The emphasis is towards an exhibiltion of work for graduation. This course includes practical experience on business aspects of art: e.g. designing and printing a catalogue, documenting work, making professional presentations, organizing, selecting and hanging exhibitions,

# CMNN173 - Practical Writing for Fine Arts

This course introduces the student to the formats and principles of written communication in an art related context. Students will establish skills in writing objective descriptions, critiques/reviews, rationales, proposal reports, and analytical essays. The planning, organizing and editing of written material will be emphasized.



# **Course Descriptions**

# **ARTS105 - Perceptual Studies**

Using the model, still life, objects, materials, the environment and the studio space, the student will learn to see and evaluate the visual world and, through analysis, interpret visual impressions into two-dimensional form through the use of pencil, paint, ink, conte, crayon, chalk and collage.

# ARTS108 - Methods and Media

Using the single figure, groups of figures, and studies of objects, the student will learn to build careful drawings emphasizing harmony and balance of tone and proportion. Using watercolour, pencil, ink and acrylic paints on paper, the course emphasizes sensitivity towards media and subtlety of execution.

# ARTS124 - Intermedia

This one semester course is designed to introduce students to the inter- disciplinary aspects of contemporary art. The course will provide students with an introduction to work in video. Individual and group projects will be structured around various techniques and methods of working, including photomontage, sound and performance.

# **ARTS126 - Painting**

Acourse designed to introduce students to a wide variety of painting techniques including colour and compositional skills.

# ARTS127 - Sculpture

This course is designed to introduce students to 3D thinking through a wide variety of materials, techniques and experiences. Students will be introduced to machine shop practice and safety. Emphasis will be placed on developing manual skills, a sensitivity toward materials and their application with wood, plaster, clay, metal etc.

# ARTS163 - 2D and 3D Design

This course introduces students to the concepts of line, form and space. An investigation into the implied and perceived relationship between two dimensions and three dimensions will form the basis of the study of these concepts, and will include aspects of proportion, composition, colour, texture, and pattern. Design will be introduced through projects based on problem solving which will develop the student's ability to analyse and synthesize a given set of variables within the structure of a particular application.

# ARTS180 - Ancient Origins to the French Revolution

This course will introduce the student to the chronological development of painting, sculpture and architecture in the west from ancient origins to the French Revolution. Emphasis will be placed on the major themes, movements and monuments that characterize the development of art from one period to the next. Contemporary social, historical and scientific developments will be discussed in order to contextualize the developments in arts. No previous knowledge of Art History is required.

# **ARTS205 - Perceptual Studies**

Use of the model, still life, objects, materials, the environment and the studio space. The student will continue to evaluate the visual world and through analysis, interpret visual impressions into two-dimensional form through the use of a variety of mediums.

# ARTS226 - Painting

A building on the understandings of devices, techniques and compositional devices through painting.

### ARTS227 - Sculpture

This course builds on the knowledge gained in ARTS127. Through a number of assigned projects, the student will be exposed to a broader range of three dimensional thinking. A continuation on developing three-dimensional conceptual skills.

# ARTS280 - French Revolution to First World War

This course will introduce the student to the chronological development of painting, sculpture and architecture in the west from the origins of the Modern state and the Industrial Revolution up to the First World War.

# ARTS294 - Introduction to Photography

This course is structured to provide a balance between technical instruction and demonstrations, out-of-class shooting assignments, in-class darkroom work, discussion of ideas and concepts related to the history of Fine Art photographic images and processes. A critical analysis of student's resulting work will be ongoing and its connection to painting, sculpture, installation art etc.

### ARTS301 - Fine Art

This second year course builds on the insights and information obtained in the first year, placing more emphasis on concepts and processes. The course takes the form of a series of projects each specifically dealing with one aspect of art, e.g., process, installations, painting, narrative.
